
Baum² Squad's "Smarts" Brings Honor





Nazi Zombies was the first thing on my mind! Kino Der Toten is the original zombie map, to unlock more maps you need to complete story mode and also a secret map is unlockable if you can free yourself from the chair... Spawning is lame in the game because about 50% of the time you will get respawned in the SAME spot, over and over.

There are good innovations to the multiplayer though. A *major* difference is the ability to sit at the Find Match screen, connect a second controller, and play online 2-player! The worst part of Modern Warfare 2 was when you and your with friends and having to continuously pass the controller back and forth in between games. Now you can bring a friend to assist in combat and destroy the enemy team. Second of all, to me, the perks make the game way fun and Treyarch made them better than before. I love how the perks change the way your character looks, along with changing the way you play. From different boots to a submachine gunner to an actual Flak Jacket for shot-gunners or a ghillie suit for snipers.

Killstreaks have changed a bit too, using a fusion of Modern Warfare 2 and World

at War killstreaks. RC-XD, my personal favorite, a little remote controlled car with a nice fat package of C4 attached. Its such a good feeling to zoom up to a couple enemies and knowing your about to blow their minds...literally.

There is also a new contract system that rewards you for what you've already been doing. You can accept a contract for X amount of points that tasks you with getting Y amount of kills in your next match. Succeed, and you get a big payday. Fail, and you have to wait to try again. Obviously, the ones with the biggest risks will pay the biggest rewards. So incentive is high with game types like Wager Match, where you can spend money and play for 1st, 2nd, or 3rd place for cash prizes. That game type is one of my favorites.

Black Ops is very worth it, anyone who liked Modern Warfare 2 will like Black Ops for the basic concept and anyone who liked Nazi Zombies will definitely like the undead modes in this game too. It's a fun past time and hey, who doesn't like knocking around some online noobs from time to time?
