Jablonski was hit from behind, which caused him to crash into the boards, knocking him to the ground. He couldn't feel his legs, or even move his hands. He was lying on the ground for several minutes, paralyzed.

Jack is hospitalized in Hennepin County Hospital. Jablonski has many supportive people praying for him all around the world, and people there for him at all times. The doctors explained that Jack may never be able to walk again, or even thought he wouldn't move, but shockingly he has been fighting through this. He is now able to sit up in a specialized chair for short periods of time. His parents even gave him a tour of the Hospital floor.

have donated desserts for the supper.


The cost was \$5 for adults, \$4 for students, and \$3 for kids. If the kids donated a

"I feel really good about this project," Cassie said. "We eamed over 507 dollars!" The money raise by Cassie and Ashley go with Dr. Severson directly to Haiti, to help the children. The girls raised a lot of money, and made a difference in those children's' lives. Great work girls!







Jaques Art Center looking for student submissions




